"Mom, I know we were going to travel south to get one little boy, but I just got news about a little girl and her baby brother who are in the same area. Their father left their mother and is living with another lady. When her baby boy was born she had a possible small stroke." Panuel informed us of this situation as we prepared for our trip to the South. I told Panuel that we would like to stop by to evaluate the situation.


I was excited about this trip for my sister, Nadine, and her grandson, Damien. They were visiting us for the first time, and I wanted them to see what it is like in the villages.

We traveled southeast over rough roads winding through rice growing country. Harvest season had begun and everywhere men and women were cutting down the ripe rice stalks, binding them into bundles and carrying them to their homes. It looked like hard and tiring work.

After two and a half hours, we turned on a side road. The

village homes were made of mud and plastered with cow dung. They looked smooth and clean, some were painted

with decorative designs. In the doorway of one of the homes sat a young lady breast-feeding her infant boy (Zechariah). Her little two year



Panuel had told me about. We talked to the mother for awhile and told her that in order for us to accept her children, she must first complete the required government paper work. Only then could she bring the two children to our home. She said she would, and a few days later she came to our campus with the children. She soon left to find work to support herself.

We continued on our journey, and in about an hour and a half reached a little Adventist village. In the village there was a church and a school. The pastor came out to greet us. He was the one who had phoned us. Soon the mother came from one of the homes carrying her young son (Jeremiah). She had

been married to a man much older than she. He died soon after the baby was born. Now she is all alone and has no way of adequately caring for her son.

Parting with one's child is hard to do. We asked her if she would travel back with us to see her son's new home and ease the pain of parting. She agreed and stayed a day before leaving to find work.

Helping Hands By Robyn Griffin

Standing on the edge of eternity, we realize that God has given us certain requirements to be His representatives... those who have clean hands and a pure heart. Clean hands are the result of a pure heart...but training from Godly sources is exceedingly necessary. What better way to learn these lessons than through Godly examples and learning-bydoing. The one question that Jesus asks when He returns is: "What have you done for Me in the person of the poor and the suffering?"

Bangla Hope Pathfinders—The Pathfinders (similar to scouts), directed by Litton Mowalie, CFO for Bangla Hope, are learning to use their hands, feet, and resources to bless those less fortunate than they. Children at our home are blessed by sacrificial people from the US, Canada and other parts of the world including the dedicated staff located

at the Home itself. In turn they are learning to use what they have to help complete that great circuit of benevolence instituted by the King of kings and Lord of lords.

The club began in August of 2014. Up until



that time there had not been an Investiture honoring the students who had completed their requirements for their classwork for their honors. This school year the students studied Friday mornings from 8-9:15 AM to complete their specific classwork. The hard work paid off as 69 Adventurers and 22 Pathfinders were invested on October 17, 2015.



On October 4, 2015, classes 2,3,4, and 6 spent an unforgettable day at the Shopnopuri Zoo. (Our 5th graders were taking their Government Exams that day.) The zookeeper, upon learning the children were orphans, opened his heart

and the gates to allow the children to enter for free. Delights abounded as the children experienced a joy that was new for them. God bless the zookeeper for his gift!

Pathfinders were thrilled to go on a campout at Beldanga SDA Church October 9-11. West Bangladesh Mission's Youth Director, Amol Baroi, encouraged the members with

the theme "God Is Light". Bangla Hope Pathfinders amazed the director with their special style of marching and drill. Activities on the campout included hikes, arts and crafts, marching and drill, honor classes, cultural



lights, campfire, treasure hunt, temperance programs for the community, repairing the community road, training in personal hygiene and building new friends in the community. Now that's a packed campout schedule.

The Pathfinders also found other ways to be helping hands. In November 2015, the Pathfinders actively collected funds on the Bangla Hope campus and distributed Tk. 668 to a man in Hazrapur who had very little food and clothing. "If ye have done it unto the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto Me."

Sabbath Activities—Early each Sabbath morning Bangla Hope's Chaplain, Panuel Baroi, his secretary, Motilal Roy, and 3-5 children hold health seminars/worship services under the trees in Hazrapur, a tribal Hindu community, just outside the gates of Bangla Hope. Panuel, often accompanied by his wife, Lichil, go from house to house greeting the people in the name of the Lord, inquiring on the needs of the

family, praying for the sick, and inviting the folk to the gathering place under the trees for worship. The children provide the special music. Following the meeting, food is distributed to those who attend. Between 25-30 children and adults usually attend these meetings. The good news is that other Hindu villages are earnestly requesting similar worship services and health seminars.

Sabbath afternoon finds our students heading to the nearby Gohara Bangla Hope Village School to hold a branch Sabbath School. Classes 1-6 take turns week after week leading song service and distributing pictures for the children to color depicting the Bible story told that day by an accompanying adult. The children enjoy the mile walk down the bricked road to the enthusiastic students at the Gohara Village School.

Dorcas Society/Community Services—On November 2, 2014, the Bangla Hope Church was recognized as an organized church by the West Bangladesh Mission. Suchitra Soren was elected as the Dorcas Society leader at that time. After her election she requested that all of the women employed by Bangla Hope become members of the Society. The women were moved as Suchitra shared with them the story of Dorcas from the Bible and how she helped the poor. The group discussed various ways they could raise money for the poor and needy people in the local area. They decided to:

- 1. Contribute personally five taka every month
- 2. Hold a bake sale
- 3. Work on Sundays planting or harvesting the rice fields
- 4. Mend clothing for those who are unable.

On November 15, 2015, the Dorcas ladies held their 2nd annual bake sale to raise money for the local poor. The children at our Children's Home were as excited as bumble bees knowing that this would be a time for them to purchase home-

made goodies. Each child was given Tk. 20 to spend how they wished. At 4 PM the fun began...you would have thought they were at Disneyland! Children making decisions as to what they were going to do with "their" money...delighting in the joys that we often take for granted! I cannot count the number of times children offered to share their "treasures" with me. I repeatedly told them, "You eat it!" The fun was also experienced



by some local villagers. There were eighteen different delights for customers to choose from. When it was all done most sellers were sold out. The bake sale was a smashing success with our children and netted Tk. 2.055 for the Dorcas fund.



A week later, the Dorcas ladies hit the rice paddies at 7 AM to harvest rice. In a few short hours they harvested 33 decimals of land to add another

Tk. 1000 for their fund. They hope to purchase a sewing machine in order to sew clothing for the poor villagers.

Sabbath afternoon is an important time for the Dorcas ladies who meet and pray together or go into the village to pray for the sick.

Looking for ways to be the "hands and feet" of Jesus is our high calling and our greatest privilege. Perhaps you will be inspired by the earnest efforts of our Bangla Hope family and dedicate your hands for the King.

PROJECT UPDATES

Church—You've contributed \$34,807 towards a goal of \$115.000.

Cyclone Damage Repair—You've contributed \$2,382.70 towards repairs and tree replacement of \$4,035.

Security Wall/Fencing—Work has begun on the 2300 feet of steel reinforced brick wall (8-10 feet high). Cost is about \$35 per linear foot. Presently we have enough funds to fence almost 600 feet.

Campus Well—Donations received: \$25,623.
