A Life of Saying "Yes" to God (A Farewell to Dave Waid) By Roger Cook

Imet Dave Waid in 1978. He had just recommitted his life to God and he was on a journey of recovery. Dave left the ways of the world behind and surrendered his whole life to his Savior. Dave and I became good friends, and spent a lot of time together. He liked most sports and was good at almost every one. He would take me golfing or try to teach me tennis, but I am sure I disappointed him at both. I am certain that more than once he thought to himself "There is no hope for Roger." But he never made me feel like a hopeless case.

In time, Dave was introduced to a schoolteacher named Beverly Hatley, and in 1980 they were united in marriage. This began their life of service to God together, and the adventure of a lifetime. My wife was also a teacher, which added to the things we had in common.

In 1987, Dave first learned of the need for sponsors to assist impoverished Bengali children in acquiring an education. They began sponsoring eight children, and eventually traveled to Bangladesh and started their years of traveling in their RV recruiting sponsors. Within one year, by the Grace of God, they had recruited 200 sponsors!

Dave was a consummate businessman and a man of integrity. Accountability was of paramount importance to him. It soon became apparent to Dave that the best way to ensure precisely how the funds he raised were used was to begin his own ministry. In 2001, when Dave was 72 years old, they began Bangla Hope.

In 2004 their Children's Home in the capital city of Dhaka was started. They began with a few abandoned infants. I never thought I would see Dave holding babies. He had always been more comfortable with older children. It just goes to show that when you say "Yes" to God, He will change you in ways that even those closest to you would never imagine.

In 2006, it became apparent that they needed to move out of Dhaka due to crowded conditions and pollution. By the end of 2008, we had purchased land in the country and the building process for the Administration building and staff housing was nearly completed. Dave often said that he never intended the work to expand so. But he had a big God. Today, 165 children and youth are being raised at our Children's Home.

Dave's love of sports led to his loss of eyesight in one eye during a game of badminton. That event led to his decline in health and strength. Dave went to his rest on January 20, 2022 at the age of 93. He is awaiting his reward for a life of service to others.

My prayer is that the story of Dave's life inspires you to say "Yes" to God as Dave did and watch what happens.

Goodnight Dave. We will see you in the morning.

All of the students who have passed their 10th-grade exams will be continuing their studies at SAMS with the exception of Alex Kisku who has been accepted at Notre Dame College in Dhaka where he will be excused from all classes and exams on the Sabbath, and Brooke Bala who is studying an American Curriculum on the Bangla Hope campus.

Construction Updates By Robyn Griffin

Multi-purpose Building (MPB):

Two and a half years ago, construction began simultaneously on two buildings, the MPB and the Girls' Dorm. Despite COVID-19 and the many hurdles it presented, the building has progressed, though is not yet complete. The MPB is currently being used even

though it needs to have windows installed, doors on the upper level hung, the back rooms completed, furniture purchased, and installation of fans, lights, projectors, and sound equipment.

Girls' Dormitory:

The Girls' Dorm is currently having lockers built. The girls are not yet in the new building because it is located directly next to our old cow shed/dairy. As you can imagine, it is not an ideal environment.

We need to build a new dairy in another location, but have been delayed due to "red tape". Government beaurocracy has presented us with a roadblock, but we know prayer will help us break through. Once God provides us with His answer, we will build the new dairy, move the girls into their new home, and begin construction on the next phase which is the 2nd floor of the dorm. We had estimated some time ago that the 2nd floor would cost \$376,000. However, that was prior to the war in Ukraine, and the resulting inflation. During the pandemic, He led us to opportunities for being a blessing to those around us. Two years ago, we were made aware of a woman living nearby our campus whose roof was falling apart. We were asked to repair her roof, but God desired to build her an entire new house. Within a few short days, her mud and dung house was removed and a fully financed, small brick, two-room home has replaced it. This house will not succumb to the elements as the previous one had.

That woman's need opened our eyes to others who were in dire need of adequate housing. The homes we are about to update you on have all been paid for through your donations.

Simon's House:

Simon is the lead security guard at SAMS, and he is confined to a wheelchair. The SAMS campus is not exactly accommodating for someone who is W/C bound. He now lives alone, and has great difficulty accessing his current house that does not accommodate his physical limitations. Plans are in the works for a completely W/C accessible living quarters for Simon.

Chonmoni Toppo's House:

Chonmoni's house is nearing completion. She is the mother of one of BH's former caregivers, Laxmi. Chonmoni has had to leave her housing with family, and is anxiously waiting for her house to be completed.
